Barangay Seminar enhance dads' skills

Punong mostly barangays, first-timer in government service, participated in the latest Good Barangay Governance for National Transformation of the Pimentel Institute for Leadership Governance (PILG) at the University of the Philippines NCPAG auditorium from November 13-14, 2014.

The participants came from barangays in Malabon City, Bayawan Negros Oriental, Victorias, Negros Occidental and Puerto Princesa Palawan.

It was an introduction into the nitty-gritty of barangay public service for the new public servants during the two-day seminar-workshop.

The talks began with the evolution of the barangay in the country, by Atty. Gwen Pimentel-Gana, President of PILG.

PILG Chair Nene Pimentel gave his talk on the subject, "Public Service is a Calling" to emphasize to the barangay leaders that their entry into government service serves a higher purpose in society.

Commissioner Alex Brillantes of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) explained the "Pillars of Good Governance" and shared with the participants some "Best Practices" in barangay public service.

Senator Koko Pimentel dropped by to give an update of the bills he has filed that are significant to local government issues, particularly the need to increase the share of local governments in the national taxes.

The participants got immersed into the salient provisions of the local government code, particularly on their powers as public officers endowed by law, the legislative processes and a basic course on understanding the legal framework of the barangay budget process, by Atty. Elmar Jay Deiaresco.

The participants then grouped together to prepare a barangay budget during the workshop that followed.

Andy Rosales, a longtime community organizer, shared his vast experience in NGO participation and partnership in local government affairs.

Pastor King Flores gave his lecture on Leadership and Core Values focusing on his "SAHIG" model which stands for the values Sacrifice, Accountability, Humility, Integrity and Generosity, which are vital in effective public

On the second day, participants listened to a retired Colonel in the US Armed Forces, Reynaldo Sandico, share his expertise in "Barangay Communications, Disaster Risk Management and Climate Change."

Other topics that enriched the participants knowledge include the barangay justice system, with a lecture given by lawyer Luigi Gana.

Prof. Nene Pimentel hammered on the ill-effects and dangers of corruption in public service.

Fr. Francis Lucas discussed the importance of observing ethics in public service.

Architect Roy Carandang shared his views on the real aim of power and authority which is to serve the best interests of the people.

Facilitators during the barangay seminar were PILG Fellows Hugh Nguven and Prof. Norma Camunav who acted as moderators.

Neither did he say that civil unions of persons of the same sex was anywhere near being accepted by the Church in lieu of its long standing tenet that marriage is the union of man-and-woman, not of man-andman, or woman-and-woman.

In the view of The Center, what the Pontiff said is that it is wrong for us, Christians to ostracize those living in sin especially if they manifest a sincere desire to rectify their sinful ways.

Indeed, "who are we," as the Pope says, "to condemn sinners?"

In his brief speech, Pimentel cited the history of mutual assistance between the two nations dating back to the Korean War in the 1950s.

"South Korea and country are inseparable allies in the ASEAN in our countries' determination to help deter the aggressive tendencies of other countries that might undermine peace, progress and development in our part of the world," Pimentel noted.
